Latin Without Tears pages 157b - 158 give further practice in second conjugation verbs and also translating the numbers one and two. Pages 159-162 complete the practice of second conjugation verbs. The verb *terrere* "to frighten, to terrify" is on your vocabulary list for IGCSE and should go in your notebook.

Have you ever seen abbreviation "fl." after someone's dates in a history book? It stands for *floruit*. It is used when we do not know the birth or death dates of a person but we do know roughly when they "flourished"!

Terrere "to frighten, to terrify"

Bible example:

sed et mulieres quaedam ex nostris **terruerunt** nos, quae ante lucem fuerunt ad monumentum Luke 24:22.

Here the two disciples on the Emmaeus Road explain what happened on the resurrection morning, not realising that they are speaking to the risen Saviour himself!

Mulier means "a woman" and monumentum is "sepulchre." Can you guesslate the rest?
