Defective Verbs



Latin verbs that lack one or more forms in their conjugations are known as **Defective verbs**. There are only three of these in the IGCSE syllabus¹: *coepisse, meminisse,* and *odisse*. They will not cause you much difficulty.

Coepisse is a third conjugation verb and it is defective in that it has no present tense.

Meminisse is a third conjugation verb. It has only a present tense but the form of that present tense is like the perfect of other third conjugation verbs.

Odisse is a fourth conjugation verb. It has a Perfect form that has present meaning (like *meminisse*) and also a pluperfect form that has imperfect meaning.

If this sounds complicated don't worry. I have set these verbs out for you below and if you say them through it will be come clear.

Coepisse

No present tense. (Remember it is "began" not "begin.") Perfect Tense:

I began	соерī
You began	coepistī
He began	coepit
We began	coepimus
You began	coepistis
They began	Coepērunt, coepēre

Pluperfect:

I had begun	coeperam
You had begun	coeperās
He had begun	coeperat
We had begun	coeperāmus
You had begun	coeperātis
They had begun	coeperant

Future Perfect:

I shall have begun	coeperō
You will have begun	coeperis
He will have begun	coeperit
We shall have begun	coeperimus
You will have begun	coeperitis
They will have begun	coeperint

Passive

perfect:

I was begun	Coeptus sum
You were begun	Coeptus es
He was begun	Coeptus est
We were begun	Coepti sumus
You were begun	Coepti estis
They were begun	Coepti sunt

Pluperfect:

I hd been begun	Coeptus eram
You had been begun	Coeptus eras
He had been begun	Coeptus erat
We had been begun	Coepti eramus
You had been begun	Coepti eratis
They had been begun	Coepti erunt

Future perfect:

I shall be begun	Coeptus ero
You will be begun	Coeptus eris
He will be begun	Coeptus erit
We shall be begun	Coepti erimus
You will be begun	Coepti eristis
They will be begun	Coepti erint

Subjunctive Perfect: You can't translate subjunctives out of context but I've put some example English in the tables below:	
I may have begun	coeperim
You may have begun	coeperīs
He may have begun	coeperit
We may have begun	coeperīmus
You may have begun	coeperītis
They may have begun	coeperint

Pluperfect:

I might have begun	coepissem
You might have begun	coepissēs
He might have begun	coepisset
We might have begun	coepissēmus
You might have begun	coepissētis
They might have begun	coepissent

Subjunctive Passive Perfect:

I may have been begun	Coeptus sim
You may have been begun	Coeptus sis
He may have been begun	Coeptus sit
We may have been begun	Coepti simus
You may have been begun	Coepti sitis
They may have been begun	Coepti sint

Passive Pluperfect Subjunctive:

I might have been begun	Coeptus essem
You might have been begun	Coeptus esses
He might have been begun	Coeptus esset
We might have been begun	Coepti essemus
You might have been begun	Coepti essetis
hey might have been begun	Coepti essent

Meminisse

This verb has only the present, imperfect and future simple tense which look like the perfect tense, pluperfect tense and future perfect tense of a normal third conjugation verb:

Present:

I remember	meminī
You remember	meministī
He remembers	meminit
We remember	meminimus
You remember	meministis
They remember	meminērunt, meminēre

Imperfect:

I was remembering	memineram
You were remembering	meminerās
He was remembering	meminerat
We were remembering	meminerāmus
You were remembering	meminerātis
They were remembering	meminerant

Future:

meminerō
memineris
meminerit
meminerimus
memineritis
meminerint

Subjunctive You can't translate subjunctives out of context but I've put some example English in the tables below:

Present:

I may/would remember	meminerim
You may/would remember	meminerīs
He may/would remember	meminerit
We may/would remember	meminerīmus
You may/would remember	meminerītis
They may/would remember	meminerint

Imperfect:

I might have remembered	meminissem
You might have remembered	meminissēs
He might have remembered	meminisset
We might have remembered	meminissēmus
You might have remembered	meminissētis
They might have remembered	meminissent

Odisse

is a fourth conjugation verb.

Present:

I hate	$ar{o}dar{\imath}$
You hate	ōdistī
He hates	ōdit
We hate	ōdimus
You hate	ōdistis
They hate	ōdērunt, ōdēre

Imperfect:

I was hating	ōderam
You were hating	ōderās
He was hating	ōderat
We were hating	ōderāmus
You were hating	ōderātis
They were hating	ōderant

Future:

I will hate	ōderō
You will hate	ōderis
He will hate	ōderit
We will hate	ōderimus
You will hate	ōderitis
They will hate	ōderint

Subjunctive You can't translate subjunctives out of context but I've put some example English in the tables below:

Present:

I would/may hate	ōderim
You would/may hate	ōderīs
He would/may hate	ōderit
We would/may hate	ōderīmus
You would/may hate	ōderītis
They would/may hate	ōderint

Imperfect:

I might have hated	ōdissem
You might have hated	ōdissēs
He might have hated	ōdisset
We might have hated	ōdissēmus
You might have hated	ōdissētis
They might have hated	ōdissent

These three words will be unlikely to trip you up if you just remember that they **are** defective. The context will generally help you to get the correct tense.
