means you should not just write about Virgil's descriptions but use "on the one hand on the otl	her
hand to ensure you answer the question. Quote from the set passage as much as you can. You	do
not need to quote in Latin, though if you can, do so. Keep to the point. Anything you write which	ch is
"off topic" will just be ignored.

- (a) *forma viri*. (line 591) Who is this person? How has he come to be on the island? What two things does he see that makes him hesitate to approach Aeneas and his followers? [4] Achaemenides, a companion of Ulysses.[1] He was left behind on the island when Ulysses and his other companions escaped from the Cyclops Polyphemus. [1] He sees the Trojan clothes [1] and weapons [1].
- (b) *ignoti...* ...ad *litora tendit*. (lines 591-2): how does Virgil make this a vivid description of what happened? You should discuss both what he says and how he says it. [4] Virgil makes his description of Achaemenides vivid by choosing words *ignoti*,[1] *nova*,[1] *miseranda*, [1] that deftly paint his strange and pitiful condition. *ignoti nova forma viri* is a small chiasmus [1] which emphasises this.
- (c) Translate *per sidera... ...tollite me, Teucri.* Lines 599-601. [5] Check this with your flashcards.
- (d) What confession does he make and what punishment does he suggest for himself? (lines 601-605).

Achaemenides confesses that he is a Greek, one who has made war against the Trojan gods, [1] and he suggests that the Trojans scatter him over the waves or drown him.

- (e) Give one way in which Virgil matches sound to sense in line 3. [1] This line has the maximum number of dactyls to illustrate Achaemenides rapidly beating heart as he offers to die as a punishment.
- (f) 'Virgil's vivid description is what makes the Aeneid so enjoyable.' How far do you agree with this statement based on the extract of the Aeneid you have read? Support your answer with reference to the text. You should write at least 100 words. [10] On the one hand Virgil's vivid descriptions such as that of Achaemenides with his unkempt beard [1] and his clothing fastened together with thorns [1] or the picture of Polyphemus groaning and gnashing his teeth [1] while he bathes his blinded eye [1] make for very enjoyable reading. Virgil's description of the stinking Harpies with their girl faces,[1] wings,[1] clawed hands [1] and thin hungry faces, [1] while it is not perhaps strictly enjoyable, is certainly vivid. When it comes to places, on the other hand, we sometimes feel we would enjoy a more vivid description. What were they like, for instance, these "Clashing Islands"? [1] Virgil does not tell us. He lists the places past which the Trojans sail, Zacynthus, Dulichium, Same, Neritos, Ithacas, Mount Leucata etc. but beyond isolated the words "wooded", "steep", "reefs", "cloudy heights" we have little to help our mental picture. [1]

You may have something very different and still get full marks. The important points are that you answer the question "How far..." (On the one hand... on the other hand... and use the words "enjoyable" and "vivid" to keep you on track) and you quote from the Aeneid in English if not in Latin.
